\*One unit may be exempt through validated full-year participation in school sponsored athletics, marching band, dance and/or JROTC. JROTC credit satisfies this one unit. A student who validates full-year participation in these school-sponsored activities may substitute one unit of credit in any other elective area for the second unit of Physical Education.

\*\*If a student plans to attend a 4 - year college or university, DeKalb County School System **recommends** that the student take Chemistry.

Students are required to select elective courses based on the area of concentration with a minimum of three (3) units within the area of Career Technology or a minimum of three (3) units within the area of Humanities. Career Technology units must be in one of the following areas: BUS ED, FCS, TE, T&I or JROTC. Humanities include the following areas: World Languages, ESOL, Fine Arts, Visual Arts, Performing Arts, ELA and Social Studies.

All identified ELL students must be enrolled in an ESOL course. Course level placement must be made per results of the ACCESS and/or WIDA Standards Language Proficiency Level. For approved ESOL delivery models, please refer to GaDOE ESOL Resource Guide.

^Transfer students who have earned 0.5 CU for Economics have met state requirements; therefore, transfer students must take another 0.5 CU social studies elective to meet local graduation requirements.

#### August

Research different two-year, four-year and technical colleges.

Contact your high school counselor for help with any questions about colleges.

Lithonia High School's code is 111-845.

Mail or email colleges to get on their mailing list.

Plan college visits and interviews.

Pay senior dues.

Write or update your resume.

Get involved and maintain a commitment to extracurricular activities. Colleges look at you have done during your high school years, especially with community service.

#### September

Meet with admissions representatives who visit LHS and/or attend college fairs.

Call for campus tours. Visit colleges that you would be interesting in attending.

Select 2-4 colleges you are definitely interested in and whose entrance requirements you meet.

- Mark down application deadlines for these schools.
- Complete applications for these schools. Keep copies of all forms you submit.
- If your school (college of choice) requires an essay, ask your English teacher to review it.
- ➤ If your college(s) of choice requires letter(s) of recommendation, give a copy of your resume and/or student profile to a teacher or counselor. Profiles are available in the Counseling Office or from your teacher. Allow two weeks for teachers/counselors to complete.
- Remember to pay the application fee (\$15-\$100+) by credit card online or by mail using a check or money order.
- Send official transcripts to the schools where you applied. Request transcripts in the Counseling Office

Military Service – take the ASVAB test. (Test provided at Lithonia High.)

#### October

If you have not done so, mail your admissions applications.

Take the SAT or ACT if you have not done so already and/or retake the test if you want to improve your scores.

Check your school(s) requirements regarding immunizations. Make doctor's appointment to get any immunization needed.

Keep your grades as high as possible. Even though colleges may tentatively accept you, they can reject you later if your grades do not say the same.

Continue to research scholarships.

Continue to stay committed to extracurricular activities.

MILITARY SERVICES: Research benefits of each branch service.

Talk to recruiters.

Get information about educational opportunities and possible college credit for military service.

Talk to people who have served in different branches of the military.

WORLD OF WORK: Begin researching careers you are interested in pursuing.

Use www.careercruising.com to help narrow your choices.

Interview people who are working in the career(s) you want to pursue. Ask if you can shadow them one day.

#### November

Participate in Georgia Apply to College.

Take the ACT and/or SAT. Make sure your scores are reported to the college(s) of your choice.

Mail college applications if you have not done so. DO NOT MISS DEADLINES!

Ask for letters of recommendation. Give letter of recommendation forms to the teachers you have chosen, along with stamped, addressed envelopes so your teachers can send them directly to the colleges. Be sure to fill out your name and address and the school name on each form.

MILITARY SERVICE- Narrow your choices and re-contact recruiters for additional information.

WORLD OF WORK- Complete and/or refine your resume.

Practice your interview skills.

Pay your senior dues.

Use the holiday season to participate in various community service projects.

#### December

Review the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FSFA) at <a href="www.fafsa.ed.gov">www.fafsa.ed.gov</a>. DO NOT SUBMIT before January 1<sup>st</sup>.

Once you have been accepted and decided to attend a school, contact the school's Financial Aid Office.

Apply for student housing if you are going to live on campus.

Continue to apply for scholarships and grants.

Study for your final exams. Remember grades are very important.

Prepare for oral presentation of Senior Project if you are currently taking British Literature.

#### **January**

Complete federal and state tax returns (parents and students) as soon as possible. The information from these forms is used to complete the FAFSA.

Complete the FAFSA online at <a href="http://www.fafsa.ed.gov">http://www.fafsa.ed.gov</a>.

You can complete the FAFSA before you file tax returns using estimates; however, you will have to update the information once your returns have been filed.

You must complete the FAFSA or the Hope Scholarship & Grant Application to receive HOPE funds.

#### **February**

Attend Financial Aid Workshop

Apply to colleges that are still accepting applications.

Continue to apply for scholarships.

Last chance to pay Senior Dues. DEADLINE - FEBRUARY 27, 2014

\*Always make copies of the paperwork that you mail for your records.

#### March

Monitor your email or mailbox for the "Student Aid Report" (SAR). This report shows the results of the FAFSA.

Begin submitting acceptance letters to the counselor's office. If you have made your final college decision, notify the other schools who have accepted you to let them know you will not be attending.

Focus on your grades. Final grades are important to your college.

#### April

Monitor important deadlines at your college (housing, financial aid, orientation sessions) and submit necessary forms.

Submit all acceptance letters to the Counselor's Office by April 12, 2014.

Follow up on all financial aid information.

See Ms. Fletcher and/or Beta Club Members to have your picture taken for the Senior Wall.

Complete the FAFSA if you have not done so.

#### May

Prepare for oral presentation of Senior Project if you are currently taking British Literature.

Pay all outstanding fees/fines. Students will not be able to participate in graduation until <u>all</u> fees (library fines, band fees, ROTC fees, book feeds) have been cleared.

Contact your college to see if you have submitted all necessary paperwork.

Request a final transcript to be sent to the college you have been accepted and plan to attend.



# SENIOR PROJECT



High School seniors are nearing the completion of 12 years of education. They have taken a variety of courses and developed an assortment of skills during those years. The senior year is a time for students to combine their knowledge and skills in a senior project to show what they have learned. The Academic Yearbook provides an opportunity for a student to choose an area of interest, conduct **indepth** research, and demonstrate problem-solving, decision-making, and independent learning skills.

The Senior Project is challenging; it requires considerable effort on the part of the student in showing what he or she has learned. A good Senior Project causes students to plan in order to meet deadlines and manage the project successfully.

In 12<sup>th</sup> grade, the Senior Project consists of a written research report, a major product, and oral presentation, and a written portfolio of various types of writing. The four components are:

- **Research paper**—a formal paper that encourages students to develop and demonstrate proficiency in conducting research and writing about a chosen topic.
  - Length: 5-10 typed pages (double spaced)
  - o Writing Style: Formal
  - Sources: 5 different sources (no more than 2 internet sources)
- **Product**—a tangible creation based on choosing, designing and developing an item related to the student's field of study (research paper).
- **Oral Presentation**—a formal presentation with a multi-media must be given before a panel of judges.
- Writing Portfolio—In accordance with the new Common Core GPS standards, students will
  demonstrate the ability to "will employ strong, thorough, and explicit textual evidence in their
  literary analyses and technical research." Students will complete several literary analyses and
  narrative writing including, but not limited to a compare/contrast essay, editorial response,
  autobiographical incident, poetry, formal interview, letter of intent, college application, resume,
  career and college comparison.

The Senior Project is a major component of the British Literature curriculum, which is required for graduation.

Pre-Commencement

Location: Lithonia High School Gymnasium

Date: Sunday, May 18, 2014

Time: 3:00pm

Students must arrive at 1:00pm and assemble in the auditorium. **Cap and Gowns are required for participation in this event**. See "Attire for Graduation and Pre-Commencement" on page 16.

Graduation Practice

Attendance at commencement practice is **mandatory** and a prerequisite for participation in the commencement ceremony. Students must be on time and attentive during a practice.

#### **Practice**

Practice will be held on Monday, May 19, 2014 from 11:00 am until 1:00 pm. Practice starts promptly at 11am. All graduates must be seating by 10:30am. The doors of the church will be secured and locked at 10:45am. Enter the church from the rear entrance.

Location: Greater Travelers Rest Baptist Church

You must provide your own transportation to and from graduation practice.

As with all Lithonia High School activities, the dress code established by DeKalb County School District will be in effect for practice.

Graduation

Commencement will begin promptly at 9 am at Greater Travelers Rest Baptist Church on Wednesday, May 21, 2014. All graduates must arrive at 7:30am. Only graduates dressed in their cap and gowns are allowed to enter through the rear of the church.

Doors will be open to the public at 8:00am.

No tickets are required to attend the graduation ceremony.

**EXPECTED BEHAVIOR:** In keeping with the dignity of the commencement, we are asking the audience and graduates not to cause noise distractions when a graduate's name is called so that all names can be heard. Please be considerate of other persons attending the graduation ceremony.

- Leave **all purses** and valuable items with family members.
- Remember to bring all items, including tassel and any approved honor cords you
  may be wearing.

After the graduation ceremony, teachers and counselors will distribute diplomas.

Following the ceremony, family and friends may meet the graduates outside in the front of the church.

Graduation & Pre-Commencement Attire

#### Male Students:

Black dress slacks (No blue jeans material.)

White collared dress shirts

Dark tie (No bow ties or string ties)

Black dress shoes and socks. (No athletic shoes or sandals allowed.)

#### Female Students:

Black dress or black skirt/blouse **Note-**Dress should be shorter than the graduation gown.

Black dress shoes. (Flats or low heels no more than 2 ½ inches are required.) Athletic shoes are not acceptable.

Small jewelry

# Only those in the proper attire will be allowed to participate in the graduation ceremony.

Only honor cords/stoles provided by the school should be added to the cap and gown.

#### How to Wear the Cap, Tassel, and Gown

High school graduation gowns should fall midway between the knee and the ankle. Gowns are worn over the required attire for graduation and zipped up in the front

**Wrinkles** in the gown should be removed from your graduation gown before commencement. Do not hem commencement gowns.

The high school graduation **cap** or mortarboard is worn flat on the head, one point of the square facing forward (like a diamond).

Female students may use black bobby pins to secure the cap in place.

Tassels are worn on the <u>RIGHT SIDE</u> at the start of the graduation ceremony, and in unison, you flip it to the left when all graduates have receive their diplomas. Women have to wear the graduation cap during the entire ceremony. **Male students must take** off the cap only during the singing of the national anthem.

Graduation dues do **NOT** cover expenses for announcements/invitations, class rings, additional apparel, prom, or senior pictures.

Payment of senior dues can be made to <u>Mrs. Rowe in room 908</u> before or after school. Cash and money orders accepted only. No checks. Students must receive a receipt upon payment of dues.

Seniors who did not pay dues last year as a junior are required to pay their junior dues this year in the amount of \$100.00. See Mrs. Calloway, Junior Class Sponsor (Room 904).

NOVEMBER 20, 2013	A hooded sweatshirt will not be ordered for students who have not paid at least \$120.00 by November 20, 2013.
December 17, 2013	To avoid a late fee, students must pay \$120.00 before Christmas Break (December 17).
January 7, 2014	Dues increase to \$240.00.
February 27, 2014	Deadline to pay all dues in full.  To participate in any future senior activities, dues must be paid by this date.  This is also the deadline for yearbooks to be ordered. Extra yearbooks will not be ordered.
